CPS-ECP is the foremost boating educational authority in Canada and our courses are offered in either Online or Classroom formats.





## Best Photo Taken OF a Boat



## Halifax Boat Show 2023! Success!



We were there! Bigtime! Halifax, Alderney and Bluenose Squadrons successfully operated a CPS-ECP booth during the entire show schedule from February 2-5. Huge thanks to Bluenose Officer, **Marcel Simard**, and his lady, **Rachelle**, for their organizing and setup work and for attending almost the entire show as volunteers. Marcel also put on a couple of seminars on the main stage, for good measure.

Also, many thanks to **Jim McMillan** for putting together and continually updating a schedule of our volunteers to take part and to those very **volunteers**! Special thanks to **Bill Towndrow** for helping to set up and tear down the booth display.

The Show is usually a great way to showcase our Squadron before the public, yacht clubs and marine businesses alike.

It was timely for our purposes when, on Friday, Master Promotions allowed is to double the size of our booth at no additional cost because the one next door was vacant.

Marcel and Rachelle had set up several laptop computers so that online registrations and memberships could be accomplished and so that various courses could be demonstrated. There was also a continuous loop of interesting CPS-ECP videos (Youtube) displayed on the large TV screen. If people answered a few basic boating questions in our quiz, then they got to enter a draw for a SALUS PFD. We also had lots of brochures to hand out featuring the Atlantic Squadron courses. Then there were discounts for the PCOC course (PCOC = Operating Certificate - 50% off, valid until March 26th - no code required) and the Maritime Radio course (regular \$125 but boat-show special was \$100 which was valid for a few days and which needed a code that was handed out at the Show).

**Bluenose Officer, Dan White** put in a few shifts at the booth on Sunday and had this to say: "I found Sunday to be pretty busy. My observation was that the location was much better than in the past, and a lot more people stopped at the booth to ask questions and chat than in years past.

We got lots of inquiries from people who lost their PCOC cards and needed replacements, but there was also a fair amount of interest in our courses."

#### Marcel told us this about the show:

"Our both was relatively busy with a lot of folks interested in both PCOC as well as Maritime Radio Courses.

The Moodle online platform was demonstrated to several folks and questions answered about online training as well as the new member benefit "Aqua Map" and other navigation software.

The draw was performed by one of the last visitors to our booth on Sunday evening and witnessed by myself, Dan White, Bill Towndrow and Rachelle Pickles. The winner of the Salus Coastal PFD was Mr. Jeff Currie.



We collected 59 completed quiz forms. A few of those were completed by family units (teenagers assisted by parents) Many parents we surprised to learn that the teenagers (a tenyear old in one case) could take a PCOC course and operate the family boat under supervision, meaning that the operator competency as well as age - power restriction regulations are not well understood by many boaters.

We estimate that 1-in-10 to15 booth visitors completed the Quiz.

I declare the Show to be a success as we have reached several hundred boaters, new as well as old. I would like to thank everyone who helped me making this show a successful one!"

## Safe Boating Council Symposium

Back in October, our Marketing and PR Officer, Bruce Kelley, took part in a symposium put on by the Canadian Safe Boating Council (CSBC, of which CPS-ECP is a member). Bruce summarizes the issues in this abstract:

" The "new boater" phenomenon is global, largely because of the Covid 19 pandemic. The CBSC brought together several experts from North America and New Zealand to discuss the

challenges we face and resources available.

The consensus is: the new boaters generally lack sufficient knowledge, experience and equipment to operate safely on the water. The PCOC is not enough and in many cases the boater is in a kayak, canoe or stand-up paddle boat and doesn't even have a PCOC.

The highest rate of fatalities comes from: smaller open boats, kayaks, canoes, PWCs and pontoon boats. And, in most fatalities lifejackets were not worn.

CSBS, with its partners and associates, have developed a number of tools and programs to address these challenges.

Through collaborative effort across the various organizations and industry players, we can hopefully save lives and enhance the boating experience for all, by reaching the new boaters and influencing positive behaviours."



## How do our Online Courses Work?

**Blended or Combined Learning Courses**: Online via Moodle: Students access their courses online via a program called Moodle (note: Moodle is described as the world's free learning platform that helps you create effective online teaching and learning experiences in a collaborative, private environment). Several squadrons may blend or combine resources such as instructors and tutors to offer such courses. Maritime Radio Courses are also offered as home-study if desired. Of course, the PCOC can be done as home-study online as well.

**Delivery Details:** 

1) Instructional videos available online (24/7).

2) Instructor-lead online sessions (Weekly - 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. Atlantic Time).

3) Personal online tutor sessions by an instructor from a local Squadron.

Additional student material (charts, etc.) are sent via Canada Post to students from the National Office.

Virtual Classroom Courses: Course material is sent via Canada Post to students. Meetings are via video app.

Home-Study Courses: The student receives the course material via Canada Post and can proceed at his/her own pace. In the case of the Maritime Radio Course, in order to receive the required 'license' (credit-card size), the student will need to meet with our Registered Examiner, either in-person or online via Microsoft Teams Meeting.

Did We Have any Lady Associates?

Yes, there have been some Lady Associates in Bluenose Squadron over the years BUT:

In December 2021 the Board of Directors resolved that Section 3.01 of the By-Laws would be amended to remove the reference to *"Lady Associates"*, since this term originated from the period when women were unable to enjoy the privileges of members. This amendment would give the *Lady Associates* the same privileges and responsibilities as full members, which includes voting privileges, the right to hold any office, access to member discounts for courses, events and member benefits, as well as the obligation of any member to pay

dues.

This required a bylaw change, which was then brought forward to the general membership. The motion was ratified by the Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons (CPS-ECP) membership at the Annual General Meeting in October, 2022.

As a result, the reference to *Lady Associate* has been removed and these members will now be Regular Members of Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons (CPS-ECP).



The Afterglow

*Afterglow* was built at Indian Point by Bill Lutwick and Tosh Melvin; we launched May 2021. We have 240 hours on her 110 hp Yanmar with 3 or 4x that in water-chatting time, picnics on one of the beautiful Mahone Bay islands, rafting up with other boats, etc...20 mackerel fishing trips in 2022 and 4 scallop dives!

To find a shoreline clean-up near you check out <u>Scotian Shores Ocean Warriors</u> on the web or on <u>Facebook</u> Scotian Shore Warriors recently received 2022-2023 Ghost Gear funding from Fisheries and Oceans Canada and they were able to bring on more Team Leaders! Most of the Team Leads are based in the Bay of Fundy and Southwest Nova Scotia areas because, through our research, Scotian Shores Warriors have found that is where a majority of marine debris washes ashore.

Scotian Shores Warriors is to have at least one organized group cleanup per month in our

respective areas and I encourage everyone to partake in a local Shoreline Clean-up.

# Some additional information about those new PUBLIC moorings that were described in our Christmas newsletter.



Please recall, in our last newsletter the details of six new public moorings and the following description: "We are very pleased to report that six (6) REGISTERED PUBLIC MOORINGS have recently been deployed. They are located off Covey big cove, Backmans big cove, Backmans little cove, Bella big cove, Masons north end and Masons big cove. They are owned by the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg and are registered with the NS Department of Natural Resources and Renewables. They have been made up and installed by a qualified marine contractor to standard specifications. The float is a yellow

ball marked PUBLIC. The above tag is attached to the pennant:"

#### Peterborough Squadron, CPS-ECP Speaker Series Event for February 16th, 2023, 7:00 - 8:30 p.m.

Join us, virtually, for an evening with electrical engineer and avid boater Gerry Thompson, from the Oakville Squadron of the Canadian Power and Sail Squadron. The event is free of charge, and all boaters and their friends and family are welcome to attend. The event will be broadcast live, using *Go To Meeting* technology. There will be a 45 minute presentation, with questions and discussion to follow.

#### Meet Gerry Thompson:

Gerry has been sailing on western Lake Ontario for 40 years and is a qualified electrical engineer. He is also a CPS Advance Pilot and a volunteer instructor for CPS's Boating 2/3 offered by a number of squadrons, including Oakville and Peterborough. On the water, Gerry crews and navigates on racing sailboats and enjoys weekend cruising on the Great Lakes.

#### What will you learn from this Talk?

Some knowledge of electricity is vitally important to the safe operation of a sail or powerboat. As you already know, electricity and water do not mix and there is high risk of electrocution, especially at dockside. A second safety concern is heat or fire from overheated cables and

connections. These risks can be avoided by following safe practices that will be reviewed as part of this speaker series talk.

Gerry will provide valuable information on the following topics:

- Basics of maritime electricity and a review of Ohm's law;
- · Electrocution risks and how to avoid them;
- · Circuit overloading and how to prevent it; and,
- Safe installation and use of boat batteries

## Reasons to Wear Your Lifejacket and to Forego the Beer (A display of breathtaking ignorance!)



Above is a photo of Baker's Haulover Inlet which is a man-made channel in Miami-Dade County, Florida connecting the northern end of Biscayne Bay with the Atlantic Ocean. The inlet was cut in 1925 through a narrow point in the sand between the cities of Bal Harbour and Sunny Isles.

It is often very rough and dangerous through this channel. It features sandbars, rock walls, strong tide currents, and gusty onshore winds that make navigation quite difficult.

## The First Tip in Navigating the Inlet: Wear Lifejackets

While people should always wear lifejackets while they are on a boat, many do not. However, not wearing a lifejacket while navigating Haulover Inlet is asking for trouble. The combination of waves, currents, winds, and sandbars could throw you a nasty surprise. You could easily be swept overboard, especially if you stuff the bow.

## Relatively new Member Benefit: Aqua Maps



Bluenose Officer, Marcel Simard, advises that he is quite impressed with a relatively new member benefit called *Aqua Map*.
